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The aim of this tour was to try to find some hard-to-get costa rican birds, both visiting well known areas and other much less visited ones. We began with a morning visit to Braulio Carrillo NP-Quebrada Gonzalez area, next few days explored the Providencia road-Cerro de la Muerte and Savegre valley, later birded the Durika sabanas and forests, and visited the Esquinas area. Back in the Central Valley, we also birded the Irazu volcano slopes and again Q.Gonzalez, one morning each.

The weather was variable, fairly good in the highlands and the caribbean slope, regular to very bad in the SW sabanas and mid mountain, very bad in the Esquinas lowlands.

Birding was very good most of the non-raining time. We had some excellent birds in the highlands and also in the Durika area, a hard to get but very promising area for further birding. We managed to find seven species I had never seen before in Costa Rica, three of them being fully new species to me. We were also lucky to get excellent views of some species, which are hard to get good views of. In short, great ten days birding in this fascinating country!

Nov 12th. Early morning visit to Quebrada Gonzalez and later to some marshes close to La Selva. Back to San Jose at noon.

Nov 13th. All day birding the Cerro de la Muerte and Savegre Valley. Night at Dantica bungalows-Savegre Valley.

Nov 14th. Early morning g birding the Dantica trails. Later drive to the Buenos Aires sabanas. Night in Buenos Aires.

Nov 15th. Early morning birding the sabanas and forests close to Durika entrance (excellent ant swarm), and then drove to Esquinas Rainforest Lodge in the Golfo Dulce lowlands. Night Esquinas.

Nov 16th. Early depart from Esquinas (awful weather) to Durika Reserve. Left our car at the entrance to the reserve for a hike uphill to Durika. Night at the reserve cabins.

Nov 17th. Early morning birding the reserve. When rain began (11am) get in our car again and made the long drive to Paraiso, close to Cartago, for the night.

Nov 18th. Early morning visit to Irazu volcano slopes. Later visit to Las Concavas pools and Cachi dam area. Night San Jose.

Nov 19th. Early morning birding Quebrada Gonzalez and el Tapir gardens. Back to San Jose for late flight back home.

- 125- Brown-billed Scythebill:** 1 Durika entrance.
- 126- Barred Antshrike: 1 male Durika entrance.
- 127- Black-hooded Antshrike: common Durika entrance.
- 128- Russet Antshrike: 1 Q.Gonzalez, 1 Durika entrance.
- 129- Plain Antvireo: 1 Durika Reserve.

- 221- Yellow-bellied Siskin*: a small flock at Dantica area. I had never seen this bird in CRica before, even though it is a supposedly "easy" target.
- 222- Lesser Goldfinch: fairly common Durika sabanas and Reserve. Also two seen Irazu slopes.
- 223- Golden-winged Warbler: 1 Q.Gonzalez, 1 Durika sabanas, 1 Durika reserve.
- 224- Tennessee Warbler: widespread and common but in highest areas.
- 225- Flame-throated Warbler: common Cerro Muerte and Irazu volcano.
- 226- Tropical Parula: fairly common Durika area. Common Cachi Dam, eye-level in coffee plantations!
- 227- Yellow Warbler: seen at the airport, sabanas and Golfo Dulce lowlands.
- 228- Chestnut-sided Warbler: common Q.Gonzalez, fairly common Durika and Cachi areas.
- 229- Black-throated Green Warbler: common Highlands and Durika Reserve.
- 230- Townsend's Warbler**: 1 Providencia road, 1 Dantica area.
- 231- Blackburnian Warbler: common Durika reserve
- 232- Black-and-white Warbler: widespread and fairly common in most visited areas.

- 243- Zeledonia**: 1 gave **great views** at the Irazu slopes, heard a lot in all highlands
- 244- Bananaquit: common Q.Gonzalez, Durika area and Cachi.
- 245- Common Bush-Tanager: 1 lower Providencia road, 2 Q.Gonzalez
- 246- Sooty-capped Bush-Tanager: very common in all highlands.
- 247- Ashy-throated Bush-Tanager**: 1 Q.Gonzalez

- 248- Black-and-yellow Tanager: 1 male Q.Gonzalez, 1 male 1 female el Tapir gardens.
- 249- Rosy Thrush-Tanager***: fairly common at Durika entrance, heard many times. 1 male 1 female **actually seen** after many unsuccessful approaches, very sulky and shy birds!
- 250- Dusky-faced Tanager: fairly common in flocks, Q.Gonzalez.
- 251- Olive Tanager: common in flocks, Q.Gonzalez
- 252- Gray-headed Tanager: many at an antswarm, Durika entrance.
- 253- White-shouldered Tanager: 1 Q.Gonzalez
- 254- Tawny-crested Tanager: very common Q.Gonzalez
- 255- Red-crowned Ant-Tanager: small group with antswarm, Durika entrance.
- 256- Scarlet Tanager: 1 winter male, Durika sabana.
- 257- Summer Tanager: fairly common and widespread
- 258- Flame-colored Tanager: fairly common Providencia road, Dantica area, and Durika Reserve.
- 259- White-winged Tanager: fairly common Durika Reserve.

- 303- Orchard Oriole: 1 male 1 female in grasslands around Buenos Aires.
- 304- Scarlet-rumped Cacique: a few Q.Gonzalez
- 305- Montezuma Oropendola: 1 Cachi Dam.
